Heller Accepts \$26,000 Check In Lieu Of Public Housing Tax

A check amounting to nearly \$26,000 was presented to the City of Greenville Thursday by Greenville Public Housing Authority in lieu of taxes on public housing facilities here. The check totaling \$25,980.86 is equal to 10 per cent of the net abetter rent of 888 units of public housing or subsidized housing in the city of Greenville.

Mayor Max M. Heller accepted the check.

Robert G. Chamlee, executive director of Greenville Housing Authority, said that this year's sum is not the maximum amount ever presented the city in the nearly 30 years of public housing.

He indicated that next year's check probably will be smaller because of an amendment which limits the amount of rent to 25 per cent of the income of the resident.

The annual check is composed of monies from public housing at Mountain View Homes, started in 1941, Fieldcrest Village begun in 1962, and Woodland Homes completed in 1963, and Lullwater and Pierce Scott Towers, now under construction, will be included in next year's sum.

Heller said the amount should show that the public housing units are helping to pay their own way for services just like those paying taxes.

"There are some housing authorities operating in the red," he said, "and we are one of the few in sound financial condition."

Heller emphasized that not all low income housing developments are public housing. Developments like Piedmont Manor are private and operate with federal subsidies, he said.

Chamlee and Elmer E. Scott, chairman of the Greenville Housing Authority, presented the check.
