TGHA Celebrates 80 Years “Building Communities of Opportunity” at Clemson ONE Center

Greenville, SC – On Aug. 23, 1938, as families struggled during the Great Depression, the Greenville City Council introduced a resolution declaring the need for a housing authority. The resolution, signed by Mayor C. F. McCullough, was approved by the City Council and The Housing Authority of the City of Greenville, SC (TGHA) was immediately formed.

The establishment of TGHA paved the way for securing low-cost federal housing for the city, which significantly improved conditions for many Greenville residents living in extreme poverty.

Since its creation 80 years ago, TGHA has continually worked to provide affordable, safe housing for people with low and moderate incomes in the City of Greenville and throughout Greenville county.

On Thursday, Sept. 27, 2018, TGHA’s 80-year commitment to the City of Greenville and its residents will be celebrated during a special anniversary event. The 80th anniversary celebration will be held from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at Clemson ONE Center (fifth floor in the ONE complex located at 1 North Main Street) in downtown Greenville.

The event will showcase TGHA’s positive impact on the Greenville community, from its founding in 1938 to its present-day achievements.

The celebration will begin with a reception from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. featuring drinks, hors d’oeuvres, and entertainment by a jazz ensemble. Exhibits illustrating significant accomplishments from TGHA’s 80-year history will be on display.

The reception hour will be followed by the anniversary program with special messages from local dignitaries, members of the TGHA Board of Commissioners and Executive Leadership Team. The keynote address will be delivered by Adrienne Todman, President and Chief Executive Officer of the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO). NAHRO is a membership organization comprised of almost 20,000 housing and community development agencies and professionals from throughout the United States.

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"We look forward to celebrating this historic milestone with the Greenville community. As we prepare for this event, we're reminded of the great strides TGHA has accomplished during the last 80 years. From an initial development with 88 units in the early 1940s, we've grown to serve approximately 7,000+ residents throughout Greenville County in our Rental Assistance and Housing Affordability Programs," stated TGHA Executive Director, Ivory Mathews.

CITY FINANCES GOOD

City council last night in its meeting at the Municipal building took four important steps.

1. It voted to set up a Greenville housing authority, paving the way for the securing of a low-cost federal housing project for the city.

2. It approved the filing of an application for a new police radio system called "radio" for Greenville's needs for the next 50 years" by Alderman James Thompson.

It set the 1938 city tax levy at 43 mills, the same as that which it levied last year.

4. It voted the way for continuing efforts to obtain a municipal auditorium for Greenville through the use of federal funds.

CANS RESOLUTION

Alderman James Thompson presented a resolution asking the housing authority to purchase and install a new set of police radios for the police at a cost of \$2,400. However, he said a 100-watt station can be purchased for \$1,115, this price including installation of receiving sets on all city motorcycles. He said the PRA would make a grant of \$1,000 on the project, making the cost to the city of the system of greater power \$1,115 or about \$100 more than the cost of a 25-watt station.

Pointing out that the city's finances are in good condition, Alderman Ken Wilson recommended that the city be kept at the same level as last year.

DELEGATION PRESENT

A delegation of city club members, and by Judge John L. Pyle and Fred, Arthur S. Pyle, appeared before council and asked that efforts be made to obtain federal aid in the construction of a municipal auditorium which was deferred. There were no set speeches, delegates conferring themselves chiefly to re-arranging.
